MAY VISIT TO KENYA - LATEST NEWS

Having returned from our latest visit to Kenya, we discovered that the conditions encountered were much worse than in the We felt it important to past. reassure everyone regarding our school, the children and their families. There was post election violence in Mombasa and all transportation came to a halt. Car drivers, public transportation etc was being burned, businesses were being looted and people attacked, this was a frightening time for the people there as you can well imagine. The violence troubles hasn't affected the area around Mtwapa, which is very reassuring to us. Caring for these people as we do, we feel for their frustrations and lack of hope of a better country. All these people want is a country where they are free to work without corruption.

The most frightening thing at this time for our children's families is loss of tourism. To understand the culture of the Kenyans, when one member of the family has a job he or she takes the responsibility of the extended family helping where and when they can. The hotels lie empty with tourism coming to a complete halt. As you can imagine the outcome of this has affected all the supporting services etc. At the onset of the violence one supermarket was cleared of food overnight, once the market was re-stocked rationing took place. In the villages food has risen in price by 20% and as predicted will rising dramatically. continue owing the lack to transportation, making the poor and needy struggle even more. We have some children who went home with their families to vote and have not yet returned to the coast. In an area that struggled to survive previously this means devastation. It is so so sad as after many years working there. we witnessing a country starting to see some major improvements, now being set back twenty years.

The rise in the cost of living has also had a knock on effect on the school budget, the estimated cost of food, necessities, books etc has risen enormously.

All the children looked in good health and were pleased to see us with smiles beaming off each child, which could fool anyone into thinking they were the most well off children in the world.

We now have 102 underprivileged and poor children, this number of children is too great for the small school with already over full classrooms, but the children are so keen to go to school, get an education, wear the uniform, that it is hard to turn them away and not discourage them. When our own school is built, this number of children and more will be catered for.

2 days after arriving in Kenya, we took the opportunity to check 3 plots of land that were for sale and chose the one that has the potential for future extensions to the school. We are in the process of purchasing 2 plots, through a Kenyan lawyer to make sure it is legal and also, at a later date we hope to obtain an NGO. (Non Governmental Organisation is similar to being registered as a charity in UK). Also - plans for a new school are being drawn up.

NEW DESKS

The rent for 2 small classrooms at the Baptist Church, £25 per month, has doubled since our last visit in November and the Church representatives have stopped the young children from having their afternoon naps in the church.

They now have to try and sleep at their desks. heads down on folded arms. 4 to a desk, this is a very uncomfortable to say the least.

In return, you will receive letters from your child, an occasional picture, and the satisfaction of knowing that you are making a positive difference in the life and future of a child and their family.
